#### IRISH NOTES AND NEWS. By Mike Swift

British Aluminium Co. Larne. 36" gauge. Peckett 0-4-0 No.1, has been purchased by a Belfast enthusiast who intends to preserve the loco in his garden. A similar loco, No.3, is preserved in the Belfast Transport Museum.

Board na Mona 36" gauge. Bord na Mona have always standardised on Ruston 4WD locos on their bog railways, but the latest arrivals, at Derrygreagh, a new bog, serving a power state at Rhope, Co. Offaly, have been built by the firm of K.H. Deutz, of Cologne, West Germany. C.D.R.J.C. 36" gauge. The items which will probably be sold to the United

States are loco No. 4 2-6-2T, 12 Coaches, 15 Wagons, and 20 Wagon underframes. Railcar No.18, a turntable, a signal box and fittings, rails and other items of miscellaneous interest. A Dr. Cox of Philadelphia, is interested in these and hopes to have them in operation in the U.S.

Loco No.2, 'BLANCHE', and other items have been despatched to the Belfast Transport Museum.

### ENGLISH NOTES AND NEWS by Mike Swift.

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Eastwell Iron Ore Co. Messrs. Redman, Halton & Swift, visited this line in January to make arrangements for moving 'LORD GRANBY' to its new home in Leeds through the efforts of the Leeds Area members, and found that most of the track from the incline head back towards the pits was being lifted by lorry.

'NANCY', the Avonside 0-6-OT which hauled the B.L.C. 'Last run' in August last had joined the other locos now lined up in the open awaiting scrap, the loco shed now being used as a garage for the two huge dumpers which have replaced the railway.

All plates have been removed from the locos, as certain people who may regard themselves as 'enthusiast' stole the plates from 'UNDERBANK', and the Company are, naturally, very annoyed about this. We would like to place on record our thanks to the Company for the present of a frame of photographs of their locomotives to the Society.

Waltham Iron Ore Co. All the track here has now been lifted, and after cutting the very rusty remains of 'BARONET', the scrap merchants completed the demolition of 'NANTES', the Corpet Louvet O-6-OT, and the Manning Wardle 'DREADNOUGHT' in November. 'CAMBRAI', the other French built loco, was saved from the torch and was despatched to Towyn by road in mid-December, where it will find a permanent resting place in the narrow gauge museum there.

More Preservation! In these days when more and more locomotives are being saved from scrap, it is getting more and more difficult to keep up to date with current schemes.

The 24" gauge system at Stewarts and Lloyds Ltd., Bilston ceased operation in October 1959, and in November last year the two Barclay O-6-OT's left the works for new homes, 'GERTRUDE' (going to Neville's Garage, Chipping Norton, and 'THE DOLL' to the Burton Green Light Rly., Kenilworth, where, it is hoped to have about a quarter mile length of track laid by the early part of this year, with the loco in operation.

'CHALONER', the 1877 built De Winton from Pen-yr-Orsedd Slate Quarries at Naattle, has been sold to a Mr. Fisher, of Kings Langley, Herts., and arrived there in September last year, and is now being renovated in Mr. Fisher's garden.

The Railway Enthusiasts Club of Farnborough are planning the preservation of the 30" gauge Proven Gas Works loco, No,1 this being an Andrew Barclay 0-4-0 T built as late as 1946.

## Notts, Gypsum Products Ltd., Kilvington, Nr. Newark. A somewhat wet and

muddy visit was

made by Messrs. Swift, Halton and Redman during January. The line starts at a crushing plant alongside the standard gauge main line, and the 36" gauge track runs for about three quarters of a mile into the gypsum quarries. The two locos are the biggest narrow gauge diesels in the Country, being 100 H.P. 0-6-0's built by Ruston & Hornsby. One arrived from A.P.C.M. Ufton in 1952, when this line was opened, and the other came from Earles Cement at Hull last year when their own line was closed.

The track is partially laid with heavy weight flat bottomed rail, and partly with old standard gauge bull-headed rail. The rolling stock consists of a number of large inside bearing tipping wagons.

NARROW GAUGE NEWS FROM AUSTRALIA On November 1st 1960, Melbourne Cup Day, and a holiday in that City, about 100

members of the Australian Railway Historical Society visited Victoria's sole steam industrial railway, namely the six mile line of the Australian Cement Company's works at Tryansford near Geelong, 40 odd miles out of Melbourne.

The line, of 3'-6" gauge, joins the quarry with the works which are about two and one half miles apart, as the crow flies. The perimeter of the quarry and those in the quarry itself, account for the remainder of the trackage.

Features of the line are a trestle bridge over a river and a tunnel. It is single track throughout, with a circular run-round for the unloading of wagons at one end of the line, with a run-round loop at the quarry end.

At the quarry, an O-6-O Vulcan saddle tank makes up the train of loaded four and six wheel wagons, whilst the empties are brought down by an 850 H.P. Clyde-built General Motors BO-BO Diesel which backs onto the loaded rake of vehicles and returns to the works. At the works a red painted Beyer-Garratt is waiting with upre empties which are exchanged for the full wagons brought down by the diesel, which returns immediately to the quarry with its further load of empties. The Boyer-Garratt meanwhile shunts its full load to the unloading bins.

In the workshops was another Boyer-Garratt also a Vulcan, whilst in steam was an ancient Hudswell Clarke used for runabout work on which the ARHS travelled over the system. Although not used, there were other small Hudswell Clarke locos and locally built Perrys. There was also an Australian standard Garratt, which will be brought into service again as soon as the diesel is due for a major overhaul. (The sooner the better, Ed.)

This Society needs £120 for the purchase and transportation of the loco from Glasgow to Farnborough, and it is in full working order.
